Seventy-six Healeys, 200 Registrants, Marked First Conclave in '76 in Indiana

Cars from across North America flocked to inaugural meet

CONCILATION 1976

Seventy-six Healeys and 200 registrants made up the coincidental magical numbers at the first AHCA Conclave ever held—in July, '76—the 200th anniversary of our country. That hugely successful first Conclave has led to many others; this year's Conclave in Asheville, NC, marks the 20th anniversary of that first meet in Bloomington, IN. Chicagoans Walt and Jeanette Blanck and Chuck and Edie Anderson, virtual founders of the Austin-Healey Club of America, were the ones who made sure it all happened. Walt tells the story:



Early in 1975 I had just been elected regional director of the Midwest Region and had also taken on the responsibility as CHATTER editor. I started to get big ideas regarding the future of the AHCA: Might there be pockets of A-H owners who would like to become associated with a national organization with common goals and benefits? Why not have an annual national

meet, with different locations every year, to allow many people to enjoy their Healey hobby with others?

I posed both ideas in a CHATTER survey questionnaire and received positive responses. But when local club members gave a cool reception to the thought of conducting a national meet, Jeanette and the Andersons and I decided to do it anyway, with or without additional help.

After a long weekend driving trip through Ohio and Kentucky in the fall of 1975, to find a suitable location for something which was only a dream, Jeanette and I were getting discouraged; we were not impressed with the facilities or perceived cooperation of the people operating the state parks we visited. Then, on the way back to Chicago from western Kentucky, we passed a place called "Inn of the Four Winds" just east of Bloomington, IN, on Lake Monroe.

We stopped in, explained our mission to the management, and were welcomed warmly. They even invited us to dinner to sample the food (it was delicious). They were thrilled with the concept of a sports car meet and pledged to do everything they could to help us with the planning and implementation.

On our return to Chicago, we spread the good news and started to work. With no patterns to follow—and not even a name for the event—we had a lot of conversations with the Andersons. I suggested calling the event "Conclave," since as a boy scout our gatherings were called conclaves. The name seems to have caught on!


In February, 1976, we returned with the Andersons to the inn to lay out the rally and a funkhana. Over the ensuing months, CHATTEN presented the details to the readership, and the reservations came rolling in from across the country and Canada, the heavy fee of \$10 per entrant not a deterrent. As the time approached, our excitement grew as more and more calls came in from enthusiastic Healey owners desiring to be part of the big party.

We were becoming a national club in a big hurry, for this interim period saw the formation of a new area club (Indianapolis), a new look to CHATTER, and a new national logo.

Finally it was time to go to the meet. We caravanned with the Andersons, Chuck's van loaded with refreshments for the hospitality suite (the stuff was less expensive in Chicago).







By Friday night, July 16, over 40 Healeys and 150 people had driven in from New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, Texas, Kentucky, Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and of course, Indiana. More were to come, from Canada, Colorado, and Washington state, all to enjoy the first of what has become standard; friendships old and new (mostly new—90% of these folks had never met before), Healey talk, food and refreshments, and the roar of Healey driving activities.

On Saturday morning the Healeys were still coming in from all over. It was very thrilling to see our dreams finally materializing. Meeting and greeting people we hadn't met before but who were destined to become friends for many years to come was truly a fantastic experience.

The event was under way. Folks registered in the morning and then ove the rally, which took them through the picturesque back roads of southern Indiana and even past an automobile graveyard with a rusting Healey sitting there. Jeanette manned the checkpoint with a Polaroid camera; she was assisted by Dudley Campbell, the designer of the new national logo. As each car came through the checkpoint, Jeanette snapped a picture, which then had to be shown at the end to Ernie and Gail Rysso as proof of having gone through the checkpoint. (The Ryssos were members of the original 1960 Midwest Region.)

Hospitality, a BBQ banquet, awards, and the funkhana rounded out the event. As the event drew to a close, we called everyone together on the parking lot. We had developed a questionnaire to get opinions on our efforts and to find out whether Conclave should be done again, and where.

The response was overwhelmingly positive, with some good ideas for the future. We had succeeded! This first Conclave brought together folks who loved their cars and who wanted to meet others who shared their enthusiasm. Most of the cars were not shiny bright as they were at subsequent Conclaves—for this was 20 years ago, and the cars were then road-weary "beaters" with up to 22 years of driving; but they came anyway. Looking back at the condition of the Healeys coming to later meets, we realize we had indeed fostered the "preservation of the marque."

As a result of the meet, a number of new area clubs were formed, and a spirit of camaraderie developed that exists to this day. We feel a great deal of satisfaction when we attend AHCA activities, knowing that the concepts we initiated are still going strong.
